Jeff Reifman first worked for me at Microsoft from 1995-1997 during the creation of MSN News and MSNBC.com. We started as a ridiculously small team on an even more ridiculous timeline. He arrived in June of 1995 and quickly got the project well defined and on track. He led the development of our first dedicated news viewing Windows app along with the production tooling and delivery system behind it. The project grew quickly. We took this work and joined with NBC to create MSNBC.com. This transition to the web was built from scratch before any of the current tooling or frameworks existed, so it was all invented as we went.

He was a key technical leader on the team. During the two years of that work, he hired and led a team of over 45 production and technical staff. He was also the regular interface to all the professional journalists using the system in Seattle and New York.
